





Alumni Spotlight

Christine Kennedy, Wheatland-Chili High School, Class of 2005

Since graduating from Wheatland-Chili High School, I have attended Monroe Community College and graduated from SUNY Cortland with a Bachelor of Arts



in Kinesiology-Exercise Science. While at MCC, I was involved in the Collegiate Science and Technology Entry Program (CSTEP) and was a Resident Assistant. CSTEP is a program that works to increase minority representation in medical, health, math, science, and engineering careers. Through this program, I received an internship at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, where I worked with the CSTEP sister program called Science & Technology Entry Program (STEP). STEP targets local high school minority students and helps prepare them further for their education in the same career paths as CSTEP. One of the responsibilities I had while attending STEP was starting and organizing the STEP database. This information was used to help the STEP Director receive more funding from New York State. In addition, CSTEP provided me with the chance to conduct scientific research at Binghamton University. I was then selected to present my research finding and to represent MCC at the Annual Biomedical Research Conference for Minority Students in Anaheim, California.

While at Cortland, I went to El Salvador for two weeks with Habitat for Humanity to build a house for a local family. I also participated in an internship for the National Football League New York Jets during their summer

training camp, and I currently work for the Jets during the regular football season and at events held by the organization. Presently, I am in my first year at Seton Hall School of Medical Sciences working on my Master's in Athletic Training and doing clinical work at Rutgers University with their sports teams. After graduating, I want to work for a Division I School as the head Athletic Trainer for a Women's or Men's Basketball Team.

The Urban-Suburban Program prepared me in so many ways for my future. As a student-athlete during high school, my time management skills were tested many times with the challenge of maintaining good study habits. These are skills that I use today to help me manage my schoolwork, my job, and the extra activities that I need to get through on a daily basis. The faculty at Wheatland-Chili also provided me with the tools I needed to maintain good grades in college and to interact on a professional level with professors, co-workers, and professional athletes.

Most importantly, the Urban-Suburban Program provides an opportunity to prepare all students for the future by placing minority students in real world situations. As students in the program embark upon a higher education or other professional goals, you quickly learn and see how minorities are under represented. Graduate school at Seton Hall is a perfect example; I am one of only three minority students in a class of 21 in the Athletic Training Program. Since working with the New York Jets, I have only seen one minority working in their front offices. The Urban-Suburban Program gives students a professional start by allowing us to become comfortable in a suburban setting. It also teaches students

at a young age how to conduct themselves and how to interact with all people regardless of the backgrounds.

Even though there were times when I did not understand why my parents were sending my brother Harry, Jr. and me to Scottsville, I have learned to appreciate the wonderful experience that the Urban-Suburban Program and Wheatland-Chili Central School District provided for me.

Harry Kennedy, Jr., Wheatland-Chili High School, Class of 2009

After graduating from Wheatland-Chili, I was accepted at The Ohio State University where I am an undergraduate student in their Electrical Engineering Program. The transition from high



school to college was rough but a true learning experience. I quickly realized that studying was a **must**. The hardest part of college for me was incorporating schoolwork into my daily routine. I learned the hard way by getting some bad grades on important tests, but I improved my work ethic and started to see the results that I wanted. My work ethic has rewarded me with opportunities that I would have never imagined at this age. I have been an active member of the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) where I am the newly-elected Vice-President. NSBE is a global organization and is represented at nearly every college. It is a great way to learn professional development, to begin networking with businesses, and to gain support from other black engineers. I have also worked with other engineering organizations that are on campus, but none have been as rewarding as the work with NSBE.

Since January 2011, I have been working for General Electric Aviation in Grand Rapids, Michigan. I interviewed for the position through NSBE at one of their fall conferences. I spend my time working on automating a report that shows the Lean Six Sigma Green Belt statistics of different departments. The Green Belt initiative helps General Electric and other companies save money by inspecting their daily actions to eliminate time lost from tasks like sending papers around for signatures. I also am working to document and test software that the engineers want to start using. Engineers have to document everything about software that they want to use because they are held responsible for anything that could go wrong with the products that they ship. The work requires me to put in extra hours, but my hard work never goes unnoticed. General Electric has taught me a lot and has been an excellent opportunity for me to network with other interns and employees. It has opened my eyes to the global options available to all students if they are willing to work hard.

I've been blessed with a lot of opportunities at my age, and it has taught me three major things. The first is to work hard. You have to take your future into your own hands, and take it seriously. Do not let apathy be the reason that you don't meet a personal goal. The second thing is to be passionate about what you do. Until somebody finds the line that divides being cool from not studying, and being poor from not studying, it's best to work hard now and not have to deal with the trouble later. Finally, make sure you do something that you love, but be the best at what you do. Money is important, but it isn't everything. If you're proficient in what you do, the money will come because people will want you to work for them.

The Urban-Suburban Program was an invaluable asset to my success. I can't repay them financially (yet), but I am an example of the character that the program develops.

Alexander Williams, Wheatland-Chili High School, Class of 2008

I attended Monroe Community College after I graduated from high school where I majored in biology and also played basketball. After attending



MCC for a year, I transferred to St. John Fisher College where I switched my major to Psychology and continued to play basketball. St. John Fisher is a great college and the lessons I learned there definitely mirrored the lessons that I was taught at Wheatland-Chili; however I realized Psychology was more of a hobby than a career choice for me, so I went back to Monroe Community College where I graduated with an Emergency Medical Technician certification in December 2010.

Currently, I am on call (since January) with Rural/Metro Medical Services; however I hope to be one of their full time employees in the near future.

The Urban-Suburban Program has, without a doubt, shaped me into the person I have become today. The program's life lessons and experiences were priceless, especially being exposed to a slower pace of life that Wheatland-Chili offered me. I would like to thank everyone involved in my education because they have had a tremendous impact on the choices I have made in order to get me to this point in my life. By early summer I expect to be riding with Rural/Metro Ambulance and helping my community as Wheatland-Chili and the Urban-Suburban Program taught me.
